1 Make the following Section a part of the Standard Specifications:

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SECTION 691 – ARCHAEOLOGICAL MONITORING

691.01 Description. This section describes having an Archaeological Monitor hired
 by the Contractor to be present during all ground disturbing activities at the location shown
 on the plans and as directed by the Engineer.

An archaeological monitoring plan prepared by Pacific Consulting Services, Inc. has been
 submitted and written acceptance with comments has been provided by the State
 Department of Land and Natural Resources, State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD).
 Copies of the accepted archaeological monitoring plan are on file at the office of the
 Engineer.

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691.02 Materials. None.

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 691.03 Construction. Actual onsite time and specific actions to be followed in the
 event of inadvertent discoveries will be discussed and agreed upon by the Contractor and
 the Archaeological Monitor at the pre-construction meeting.

- (A) Selection of Archaeological Monitor. The Contractor shall obtain the services of a qualified Archaeologist or Archaeological firm to investigate the sites prior to clearing and grubbing and to monitor construction activities during clearing and grubbing and/or drilling and excavation activities for historic remains such as artifacts, burials, concentrations of shell or charcoal.
- The Archaeological Monitor shall work in compliance with Hawai'i Revised 28 29 Statutes Chapter 6E. The Contractor is prohibited from hiring the Archaeologist that has prepared the approved Archaeological Monitoring 30 Plan for this project. In addition, the Archaeological Monitor shall have an 31 active permit with the State Historic Preservation Division to provide 32 archaeological services. The SHPD Archaeology Branch maintains a listing 33 34 of State of Hawaii permitted archaeological firms annually. - 39 (B) Schedule. The Contractor shall be responsible for ensuring that the
  40 Archaeological Monitor is aware of all pertinent construction schedules and
  41 that the monitor is present for <u>all</u> subsurface excavation activities within the
  42 project area.
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- 44 (C) Archaeological Monitoring. The Archaeological Monitor and the
  45 Contractor are responsible for ensuring that on-site work is halted in an area
  46 of significant findings and to protect any such find from any further damage

47 (i.e., construction fencing, protective covering, etc.). The SHPD Kauai office 48 shall be consulted for recommended appropriate mitigation actions. 49 50 In the event of the discovery of human remains, work shall cease in the 51 immediate find area. In situ human remains shall be left in place, and any 52 disturbed human remains shall only be removed after written notification is 53 received from the SHPD. The monitoring archaeologist shall be responsible 54 for notifying the SHPD Kauai office (Culture and History Branch), which, in 55 consultation with the KNIBC regional representative, shall determine 56 appropriate mitigation measures. 57 58 Close down construction activities in areas where potentially significant 59 discoveries have been made until they have been properly evaluated. Construction activities may continue in unaffected portions of the project 60 61 area 62 63 Field procedures to be followed for documentation of discovered cultural features or human skeletal remains include: 64 65 66 (1) standard field methods including recordation of profiles showing 67 stratigraphy, cultural layers, etc.; 68 69 mapping and photographing of finds other than human remains; (2) 70 71 (3) excavation of cultural materials and/or exposed features. 72 73 The SHPD Kauai archaeologist shall be notified and consulted with 74 regarding treatment of identified features such as cultural lavers, artifact or 75 midden concentrations and structural remains. 76 77 The Contractor shall take into account the necessity for machine excavation 78 at a speed slow enough to allow for reasonable visual inspection of the 79 work. The Archaeological Monitor shall make a "best effort" to search for 80 significant material culture remains (i.e. artifacts, features, midden, skeletal 81 remains, etc.). Machine excavation speed will need to be slowed in an area where significant material culture remains have been identified. 82 83 Significant archaeological discoveries, if they occur, shall be protected and 84 identified by construction "caution" tape, fencing, or other reasonable 85 means, until the SHPD Kauai office and the Archaeological Monitor decide 86 appropriate mitigation actions. All recovered material culture remains-with 87 the possible exception of charcoal samples for radiometric analysis-shall 88 remain on Kauai. Standard laboratory methods shall be utilized by the 89 90 Archaeological Monitor in the event that cultural materials are recovered 91 during monitoring and/or mitigation work. 92

- 93 One monitor in most instances shall carry out the necessary fieldwork. 94 Tasks will include observation of grubbing and earth-moving activities.
- In the event of night work, the Contractor shall supply adequate lighting for
  the Archaeological Monitor.
- 99 The Contractor shall abide by HRS Chapter 6E-11 which specifies the 100 following: "It shall be unlawful for any person or corporate, to take, appropriate, excavate, injure, destroy, or alter any historic property or 101 102 aviation artifact located on the private lands of any owner thereof without the owner's written permission being first obtained. It shall be unlawful for 103 any person, natural or corporate, to take, appropriate, excavate, injure, 104 105 destroy, or alter any historic property located upon lands owned or 106 controlled by the State or any of its political subdivisions, except as 107 permitted by the department."
- Field methods utilized shall include photographic recordation (where appropriate), artifact excavation (recovery and recordation), profile documentation of cultural layers and stratigraphy, excavation and recordation of exposed features, and mapping of all pertinent features on an appropriate site map. A daily log (field notes) of activities and findings shall also be kept. Gathered information shall be utilized in the preparation of the monitoring report to be submitted to the SHPD.
- 117In the event human skeletal remains are inadvertently disturbed, the SHPD118Kauai office, the Kauai SHPD Cultural Historian, and the KNIBC regional119representative shall be notified, and appropriate mitigation actions120determined.
- 122 The Archaeological Monitor shall periodically visit the monitoring site as 123 often as is necessitated by the nature of the construction activities and 124 archaeological findings. If significant discoveries are made, appropriate 125 mitigation measures shall be discussed with the SHPD Kauai office.
- 127The Archaeological Monitor shall curate all cultural materials recovered128from this monitoring project on Kauai, with the exception of human remains.129When analysis is completed, recovered material culture remains shall be130turned over to the appropriate parties. The SHPD and the landowner will131approve long-term curation arrangements of significant material culture132remains.
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691.04 Measurement. The Engineer will measure the work required for the
 archaeological monitoring, including remedial measures, on a force account basis in
 accordance with Subsection 109.06 – Force Account Provisions and Compensation and
 as ordered by the Engineer.

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139 691.05 **Payment.** The Engineer will pay for the accepted archaeological monitoring, 140 including remedial measures, on a force account basis in accordance with Subsection 109.06 - Force Account Provisions and Compensation. Payment will be full 141 142 compensation for the work prescribed in this section, by the Engineer, and in the contract documents. 143 144 145 The Engineer will pay for the following pay item when included in the proposal 146 schedule: 147 148 Pay Item Pay Unit 149 150 Force Account Archaeological Monitoring 151 152 The Engineer will not pay for work required that is due to the Contractor's convenience, negligence, carelessness or failure to properly monitor excavation activity. 153 154 155 156 **END OF SECTION 691**
